Parent Satisfaction Survey 2019

The Board is very grateful to those families/whanau who responded to our triennial Parent Satisfaction Survey issued late in Term 2. While it was disappointing that we received only 85 responses from our 482 families who had students enrolled at the College when the survey took place, a response rate of 17.6%, we nevertheless received some good feedback to consider as we continue to monitor and plan the strategic direction of our school. Of the respondents, a high portion (41.2%) were parents of Year 9 students, which meant that these parents had not had extensive experience of our school, so we believe that a number of them provided neutral answers to some questions for this reason.

Overall, the response was considered by the Board, Senior Leadership Team and Staff to be very positive, which the Board was pleased about. You as parents will be able to access the report on this survey to take a close look at it by the middle of next week when it will be available on our school's website. However, I offer some comments about its findings and some of the limitations that parents need to be aware of in terms of the Board's ability to respond to some things that you would like to see.

- The great majority of our parent respondents believe that Morrinsville College provides a quality education for our children, which is very pleasing for the Board, as is the fact that the overwhelming majority of respondents have signalled that they recommend our school to other parents in our community. We were also pleased to read comments that indicated that a number of parents are very pleased with their decision to send their child to Morrinsville College, this when we know that for most people there is a choice
- The great majority of respondents were either very satisfied or satisfied with the quality of leadership displayed by the Senior Leadership Team. This concurs with the Board's view
- The great majority of respondents indicated that they are satisfied with the general professional conduct and quality of curriculum delivery provided by our teachers, although it is clear that a small number may have had a negative experience with one of their child's teachers which has coloured their thinking. This has been discussed by the Senior Leadership Team with Staff and it is something that they will continue to work on and monitor
- Most were also satisfied with the communication that you receive from the College about your child's learning and progress, although we are keen to find out more about how we can further improve in this respect
- While in general respondents are satisfied with the range of courses and subject choices offered by the College, there are some people who would like to see more life-skills and trades-based courses offered. The problem with this is that successive governments have required schools to provide additional curricula, like the new Digital Technologies curriculum for instance, and this has resulted in a 'crowded curriculum' which is not matched by the provision of Staffing Entitlement or additional Operations Grant to fund additional teachers. As it is currently, the Board each year over-staffs from its inadequate Operations Grant to ensure reasonable sizes in the junior core classes and a good range of options in the senior school, to do our best to provide the subjects which our students would like to study. We have the problem that if we are to offer any new courses, one of our current courses would have to be dropped and current demands from students simply do not allow this to happen. The Board regrets that it cannot therefore easily widen the curriculum that we offer. Nevertheless, we will keep this in mind moving forward

- While there is general satisfaction with the provision of advice to students from our Learning Coaches, Kaitiaki, Academic Deans, Careers Adviser and Guidance Counsellors, there are some respondents who think that we could offer more and a better service in this respect. As parents, you need to be aware that there is currently poor Government funding for pastoral, counselling and advisory services in our schools and that our Base Guidance Funding has not been increased for a very long time, this despite the growing need for counselling services, careers' advice and pastoral care. Mr Inger has informed us that his records going back to 2007 show no increase at all in this funding during this time and he does not believe that this has happened at all in his 23 years as Principal. This is simply not acceptable and Mr Inger has recently been lobbying the current Government and National Party education representatives for greater resource provision for guidance, particularly for guidance counsellors because he has gathered evidence that there is currently a crisis in our country where seriously at-risk students are having to wait for long periods in order to be seen by a school guidance counsellor, thereby placing some lives at risk. This is a general problem across our country, not just at our school
- While there is considerable support for the restorative discipline processes that are operating within our school, there are some respondents who would like to see a tougher stance taken by the College with a few students who behave poorly. The Board believes that our current processes are generally in line with what is expected of schools these days by the Ministry of Education. We do all that we can to retain students in mainstream schooling, because the impact of boards excluding students has been strongly shown to negatively affect our communities. While clear lines are drawn by our Board in terms of acceptable behaviours, our Senior Leadership Team and Board work very hard to retain these students as much as we can without compromising the safety of other students, and by doing so we are effectively saving many young lives
- There is a concern from some respondents, and from the Board and our teachers too, about the academic achievement of some of our students. The Board remains proud of the hard work that our teachers put in to educating the young people of our community, even when some have a poor work ethic, and we are proud of the fact that our results clearly show that we shift the achievement of most students who are entering our school by the time that they leave us. Our NCEA results continue to be very positive and we believe that we produce some excellent, socially well-adjusted, sensitive and caring young people who most often go on to do very well in their lives. Having said this, our teachers are continuing to strive to improve their teaching practice in order to continue to improve student learning outcomes
- The Board has agreed to take a look at the food and drinks that we sell at our canteen and to attempt to offer some healthier options.


