## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

We have welcomed back to school the great majority of our students under the Alert Level 2 Delta guidelines. We have had about 90% attendance, with a few students being kept at home by their parents due to some students' health being compromised, or someone in their household having compromised health.

It is really important that all of our students return soon unless there are special health and well-being reasons why they cannot attend, in the interests of their education, because there is no doubt that face-to-face learning is the best for most students and nor are we any longer providing online learning for those who have not returned.

As in May last year, our students who have returned to school are almost all very pleased to be back and seeing their friends and connecting with their teachers. We believe that many of our students had a sound experience with the online learning which our teachers provided during the lockdown period. We were well-placed to once again deliver this online learning.

Here at school our students have for the main part been respectful of their peers and their teachers, as we have focused on rebuilding relationships, trying to find out if any of our students have experienced difficult times, anxiety or mental health issues while in lockdown, and worked hard to find out where students are at with their learning in order to help many to 'catch up'. Our students have generally willingly been part of ensuring good hygiene practices. As with last year however, social distancing with young people is very difficult to enforce, despite our teachers' best efforts to encourage them to maintain good social distancing so that they do not touch each other or come within each other's breathing space.

From this point of view, it is just as well that there is currently no apparent community transmission of the Delta virus occurring in our community. Let's hope that this will remain the case, but this virus is very infectious and it will only take one irresponsible Aucklanders 'escaping' their region to quickly create a major problem.

### Staff News

Unfortunately, our Guidance Counsellor, **Ms Jodie Morris**, has had to take extended leave for medical reasons. We wish her well with her special treatment and look forward to her return next year. We have been fortunate to secure the part-time services of **Mrs Suzanne O'Shaughnessy**, to cover Ms Morris's leave. Mrs O'Shaughnessy is an experienced counsellor, both in private practice and in schools.

**Ms Sam Walker** has commenced her work in the Mathematics Learning Area. It is always difficult for a teacher to change schools later in the year, but she is making good headway.

The Board recently received the resignation of **Mrs Gemma Bowman** from her role as LAL Art. Mrs Bowman has been on maternity leave for the last two years and decided that she does not wish to return at this stage. **Miss Jasmine Birch** has been doing a great job as LAL Art in Mrs Bowman's absence and the Board has therefore seen fit to appoint her permanently to this role.

Today we farewell **Mr Don Stevenson** from his role of a relieving teacher, particularly in the Technology Learning Area, for the last 12 years. Mr Stevenson has been a highly-valued reliever who has loved coming to our school because he has been made to feel so welcome by our staff and students.

### Senior Exams

Our postponed senior internal practice exams will be held throughout next week. These exams will once again take on increased importance this year as teachers collect evidence as a back-stop in case New Zealand is unable to hold NCEA external exams in late November and early December. Results from these exams will help teachers to look at evidence and recommend derived grades should these be necessary.

Our exam timetable was sent out two weeks' ago to our students' school email addresses. The exams are compulsory for all senior students (unless they and their teacher have agreed that they do not need to sit their internal exam) and any student not coming in to school to sit their exam will need to do so at a later date.

All senior students will be on study leave next week and they only need to come into school to attend their exams. When they do not have exams they are expected to be studying at home. If they are a bus student then we can provide rooms for them to study in when they are not actually sitting exams. **The morning exam will run from 9am to 12pm, with the afternoon exam running from 1pm until 4pm. Some bus students may need to arrange alternative transport to get home if they have an afternoon exam.**

Some rules:

- Students must wear correct uniform in the exams
- They must gather under the Canteen canopy 15 minutes before each of their exams, to be brought into the PAC
- No cellphones are allowed to be brought into the exam room. They must be in the student's school bag at the back of the PAC in silent mode
- All pens, pencils and calculators can only be brought into the exam room in a clear, see-through snap-lock-type plastic bag
- Drink bottles may be brought into the exam, but they must be clear plastic with no writing on them
- Those students requiring reader/writers will be collected at the PAC before the exam begins
- Students having an exam clash must see Mrs Keightley at the Office tomorrow to arrange another exam session in which to sit one of their exams.

### Sickness

We are noticing that a lot of students are messaging their parents when they are unwell and then they just go home without coming to the Office to report that they are sick. This is a dangerous practice because if there was an emergency they would not be able to be found and we would be very concerned. **It is not acceptable for parents to just collect**



their child and then advise us that they have been brought home because they are unwell. We also have parents turning up to the Office to say that their child is sick and we have to go and get them. This is also unacceptable. All students who are unwell must report to the Office where the trained Office staff will make a decision about whether they need to go home, in which case you will be contacted and asked to come and collect them as soon as possible. In the current Covid environment, any cold or flu-like symptoms which may possibly therefore be Covid, will result in their being isolated as much as possible until you can collect them.
